Warm-up discussion

Part 1. Students discuss the questions.

Part 2. Students read the quote and discuss the questions.

Reading activity

Part 1. Students will read a text on David Attenborough.

Part 2. Students discuss the questions based on the text.

Part 1. Students watch the video "Sir David Attenborough | A message to world leaders." (**Note:** this message was recorded a few years ago, but it still feels very relevant today.)

Part 2. Students discuss the questions.

Wrap-up task (optional homework)

Students write a short essay (180–220 words): "Who is your favourite environmental leader and why?" or record a 2-minute spoken reflection: "One change I would like to see in how humans treat nature."
