Warm-up

Part 1. Students discuss the questions.

Part 2. Students read the quotes and choose one they connect with. They then explain why and discuss the questions.

Idioms, expressions & speaking

Part 1. Students read the conversations and guess the meaning of the expressions in bold.

start the year off on the right foot - begin positively

out with the old, in with the new - remove old habits/things and bring in new ones

a clean slate - a fresh beginning

new year, new me – starting self-improvement (sometimes jokingly)

stick to - continue doing something regularly

break a habit - stop a behaviour

make it count - use time well

fall back into old habits – return to behaviours you wanted to change

Part 2. Students finish the sentences with their own ideas.

Part 3. Students choose two situations and respond using the idioms.

Suggested answers:

- 1. out with the old, in with the new clearing things out
- 2. **start the year off on the right foot** beginning positively
- 3. **break a habit** removing a distraction
- 4. **new year, new me** trying to change everything
- 5. **make it count** wanting the month to matter
- 6. **stick to** staying with something consistently

(Other answers possible – accept reasonable interpretations.)

Part 4. Students match an idiom to each picture and justify their choices.

Suggested answers:

- 1. out with the old, in with the new
- 2. a clean slate
- 3. start the year off on the right foot / make it count
- 4. break a habit / stick to something

(Other answers possible – accept reasonable interpretations.)

- **Part 5.** Students react naturally to the confessions, using the idioms where they can.
- Part 6. Students choose two scenarios and respond using an idiom.
- Part 7. Students choose one prompt and tell a short holiday story, using at least three idioms.

Reflection

Students discuss the questions.
