Warm-up discussion

Students read the four quotes and choose one that feels closest to their experience. Encourage students to explain their choice.

Vocabulary

Part 1. Students read the sentences and try to guess the meaning of each word or phrase based on the context.

Nostalgia - a warm, sometimes emotional feeling when you remember happy times from the past

Carefree - feeling relaxed and happy, with no worries or responsibilities

Imaginative play - creative games or activities where children invent stories, roles, or worlds

Freedom - the ability to do what you want and feel unrestrained

Innocence - the purity and simplicity of childhood, before life becomes complicated

Laughter - the sound or act of laughing, usually from joy or amusement

Adventure - an exciting or unusual experience, often involving exploration or discovery

Part 2. Students discuss the questions.

Speaking

Part 1. Students look at some different childhood memories and discuss the questions.

Part 2. Ask students to think back to their school days using the prompts. Then, students discuss the questions.

Part 3. Students choose one special memory from their childhood and tell their partner about it.

Part 4. Students complete each sentence with their own ideas.
